## **Welcome Mary Silverman**



Mary Silverman was born in New York City in 1928. She was enrolled in Hunter college when she had her first summer job at the Hotel Ruben in Liberty, N.Y. When she got off the bus, she was met by a charming bell hop named Al Silverman. She was sweet sixteen and had never been kissed. Al was 17 and worked in the hotel. All the employees were under 18. If you were eighteen or

over you were drafted in the Army, Navy, or Marines. During these two summer years at the Hotel Ruben, the young staff attended many dances. Little did Mary know that swing dancing with Al would change her life. Mary went on to

continue college as a math major in the field of statistics. When she graduated, she was offered a job with the USPHS (United States Public Health Service) with CDC (Communicable Disease Center) in Charleston West Virginia doing a survey on a Polio epidemic. Blood samples were collected from people who had contracted the disease and then sent to the John Hopkins University. Two years later Dr. Jonas Salk, who at that time was studying at the New York School of Medicine, developed the polio vaccine. It wasn't made available to the public until 1955.



When the survey was finished, Mary went back home to live with her father and brother in New York. One day Mary got a call from Al. He was home from the war, love blossomed again, and they got married. They had four boys and one girl. While her children were in school, she got a teaching certificate and started working with disadvantaged children helping them to read. When she retired, she continued volunteering every Tuesday with her granddaughter helping children learn and enjoy reading. Mary has 14 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren. She feels well looked after having four doctors and one urology department supervisor in the family. She loves living at the Townehouse and hopes to make many new friends here.

## **Welcome Marie Loynd**



In February, Marie Loynd moved back to the Townehouse. She is quite a gal and has done much in her 95 years. Born in LA, schooled in Pasadena, Navy Waves during WW II, then back to Arcadia for her domestic period - raised two children, horsewoman, gardener, orchardist and City Clerk for Sierra Madre. What a real treat it was to listen to the Master Gardener's talk about their program and how they give back to this community. Getting honored for their hard work and dedication were Rachel Plasch, Jenny Carr Kinney, Tim Coyne, Kristyn Shinn, Kathleen Aub and Harry Lee.

All had their specialties. They volunteer/work at the Faulkner Farm in Santa Paula, The Oxnard Historic Park, a farm in Ojai and the Hope Shed in Santa Paula.

They take this volunteering very seriously. In order to become a

Master Gardener, you would have to have 80 hours in the classroom and approximately 50 hours in hands-on work. There are nine (9) sites for the volunteer groups to work in. There are 200 Master Gardeners locally and it is the largest in the state of California and Fifty (50) of 58 Counties are represented here.

<u>Harry</u> works as the seed man in the group, <u>Ginny</u> is the "worm girl." She is at the Faulkner Farm and loves to grow her own cotton to put on her spinning wheel. She would like to come do a demonstration for us one day.
